

EXTRACTS FROM LETTER FROM MR. O. L. POLLY, BALTIMORE, MARYLAND,
NOVEMBER 8, 1936.

"His R. E. device involves no mysterious circuit although the electrical valve upon which it depends is novel. The power is not derived through the medium of a secondary power source -- no feeble current is built up as in a radio set by vacuum tube amplifier. However, no violation of the laws of thermodynamics is implied.

"Mr Moray claims the energy to be derived from the storage and discharge of the countless small electrical impulses gathered by the antenna and concentrated in condensers. Such a process is by no means inconceivable and it is a distinct relief to learn that no strange new electrical energy source is postulated."

EXTRACTS FROM LETTER BY EDWARD T. OLSEN, SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH,
JANUARY 27, 1937.

"This is to certify that during the early part of January, 1937, in the presence of Mr. A. P. Dowlin of the City Dye Works, Boise, Idaho, I witnessed a demonstration of the Moray Radiant Energy Machine in the lab at Salt Lake City, Utah.

"This is not the first demonstration that I have witnessed, but it was of special interest to me as the demonstrations used only a loop antenna and a counter poise antenna, eliminating entirely the ground wire. The loop antenna had a bare spot on the wiring, and in manipulating the loop antenna, this bare spot suddenly came in contact with the brass portion of the 150 watt light globe that was being lit by the machine, and a bluish flash, at least $\frac{1}{4}$ inch in length and a quarter of an inch in width, darted out between the wire of the loop antenna and the brass of the light globe. Upon examination I saw a mark on the brass part of the globe and a black spot on the glass of the globe. Dr. Moray reported to me that this flash had blown out 10 condensers. The connections were all out in the open where we could plainly see and inspect them.

"I have read a great number of the hundred of letters written by experts and others who have seen demonstrations during the past ten years and I feel free to say that what I have seen, I am forced to conclude that the machine is just as claimed for it by the inventor." Signed Ed. T. Olsen.
